

Cadence of a Deep Call: a Call to Practice the Divine Forgiveness

Forgiveness is, I believe, the most frequent theme that I have studied about, written about, lectured about, or preached about on Sunday mornings or in small Bible study groups. It has also been a major theme of my pastoral counseling for those who have been deeply hurt, whose souls have been severely injured and whose lives are almost destroyed. I have often said, "Forgive them." But, I have to confess that even as I said these words, my heart remained angry or resentful toward those people who had hurt me. I still wanted to hear from those who had wronged me that I was quite right and they were absolutely wrong. I have still wanted to hear their heart-felt apologies in a deeply penitent voice. I still wanted the complete satisfaction that comes from unilateral confession and unilateral forgiveness.

Why do we do what we are not supposed to do and why do we not do what we are supposed to? Could it be that there is a big gap between what we say and what we practice? Could it be that there is good inside us as well as evil as strong and tenacious as a lion? Could it be that this is the first step to start a new, joy-filled life and to become like Jesus?

I have known many people who have remained in bitterness and resentment over the things that happened to them. Many of these people cannot let go and let God. They still hold grudges against those who have sinned against them. They are still angry, resentful and fearful. We cannot get closer to God because anger and friendship do not go together. As long as we hold grudges against those who have sinned against us, we cannot be friends with God because anger and friendship do not reconcile with each other. Genuine and authentic forgiveness is different.

God's forgiveness is unconditional; it does not seek any justice to have peace of mind. It does not demand any apologies from the wrong doers. It is a completely


THE GIFTS OF THE MAGI: Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh

In addition to the honor and status implied by the value of the gifts of the magi, scholars think that these three were chosen for their special spiritual symbolism about Jesus himself: gold representing his kingship, frankincense a symbol of his priestly role, and myrrh a prefiguring of his death and embalming.

An interpretation of this was made popular in the well-known Christmas carol "We Three Kings."


Still others have suggested that the gifts of the magi were a bit more practical - even medicinal in nature. Researchers at Cardiff University have demonstrated that frankincense has an active ingredient that can help relieve arthritis by inhibiting the inflammation that breaks down cartilage tissue and causes arthritis pain. The new study validates traditional uses of frankincense as an herbal remedy to treat arthritis in communities of North Africa and the Arabian Peninsula, where the trees that produce this aromatic resin grow. Did the magi "from the East" know of frankincense's healing properties when they presented it to young Jesus?

Jim & Chicky Wallace





YOUTH MINISTRY




Camp Children and youth enjoyed representing our church in the Shallotte Christmas Parade on Dec. 1st.






Hello Women at Camp UMC!

CALLING ALL WOMEN OF CAMP



CAMP REORGANIZATION

In the 20th century, the majority of churches in the United Methodist Church (and the Methodist Church prior to 1968) had a worship attendance under 100. As we Methodists possess the propensity to organize (one of the geniuses of John Wesley), the powers that be in the general church declared that each of our churches should be governed similarly. However, they noted that churches with large congregations differed from the smaller ones in needs and leader/worker resources. This became a problem.

The problem was solved for the smaller churches as the general church allowed them to govern with fewer groupings of leadership. These groupings were categorized as nurture, witness, and outreach. Such reorganization was a breath of fresh air to these smaller churches as now they could find leaders and workers to populate their positions without so much redundancy. It was truly a blessing.

However, as some churches grew, these same categories became a burden as more ministries filled the broad groupings and leaders were overwhelmed by so much work. This is what happened to Camp Church as we were structured as a small church. These categories served Camp well for many years, and we had many capable leaders and workers who ignited our church growth. We are so thankful for their hard work for the Lord, as we now wear the well-earned reputation of being a mission-oriented church who serves the Lord so well in most aspects of ministry.

In an early 2018 Camp church meeting, a small group gathered to discuss a possible reorganization of our church. While there, I asked Cherie Compton to list the ministries under the category of Nurture, and she proceeded to quickly mention 25. Needless to say, I was taken aback. But then I asked Barbara Varnam to list the ministries under Outreach, and she cited a similar number. Immediately it was evident that our church required reorganization as we could not keep asking leaders for so much as they would face burnout. We owe Cherie, Barbara, other leaders, their predecessors, and many workers a heaping load of gratitude for their service and marvelous work!

With the obvious need to reorganize, we designed a plan that would break down the larger categories and add a few others which would make us more efficient and effective as we grow. We created new self-contained areas of ministry which we call "Teams." These Teams and their subgroups are:

Evangelism: Local witness, hospitality, visitation of prospects, new member orientation, assimilation

Mission: Local missions, national missions, international missions, disaster relief

Congregational Care: Stephen Ministry, lay visitation, shepherding, bereavement

Fellowship: Wednesday dinners, homecoming, any event with a meal

Adult Ministries: Small groups, Sunday School, discipleship, spiritual gifts

Youth/Children: Youth ministries, children ministries, nursery, Mother's morning out, VBS

Communications: Online ministries, media, intra-church ministries, directory

Worship: Traditional worship/music, praise worship/music, altar guild, worship logistics (ushers, etc.), prayer ministry

We also have some interdisciplinary groupings, which don't fit just one category, such as our SALT ministry. Our senior adults will mix and work with, and within, the Teams. Each Team has either a leader or co-leaders. Additionally, each one has a staff liaison. Since these ministry categories are new, there will much tweaking and adjustment as we go through the year. The nature of the modern church demands that such adjustments will actually continue beyond 2019 as needs arise and change. At this time, all Team leader positions are filled except Adult Ministry. The Team Leaders are currently seeking people who wish to work in their areas.


