Cadence of a Deep Call: a Call to Wash Away Our Guilt

Many people carry some degree of guilt in their hearts. A woman in our community shared her deep guilt with me. "I should have stayed with my husband when he was moved into a nursing home. It's my fault! It's my fault that he died all of a sudden." One of my former church members said to me, "I should have never given a car to my teenage son. Had I not given him a car, he would not have to be incapacitated for the rest of his life." When my mother had a major stroke, all of my family had deep guilt over her illness, especially my sister who had seven car accidents in a month right after my mother's sickness.

Guilty feelings can be a sign of our clear conscience toward God. I have met some people who do not feel any guilt, even after they have committed blatant sins. Their consciences are totally desensitized to the point that they don't even know what they have been doing. They don't feel any pain, even after they hurt the people close to them. Their consciences have become so callous, so perverted that they don't know what is right or wrong. True guilt feelings are the sign of God's people. They lead us to repent of our sins. They are the safeguard from our eternal falls.

However, having guilty feelings are not good for anybody, especially for ourselves. How do people deal with their guilty feelings? Many people in this world try to hide them, avoid them, repress them and deny them as if nothing happened. Sometimes, guilty feelings can be the cause of substance abuse. We may also suffer from feelings of inferiority, develop a poor self-image and lack in confidence as children of God.

But, the good news is this: God already knows our imperfections, our failures, our weaknesses and our sins. He is willing to forgive our sins and wash away our guilt

CAMP HERITAGE

English-America began in July 1585, on a beach, in North Carolina; its mysterious demise created the legend of the *lost colony*. Undaunted, the English would return to the region in the early 1660's, to the Cape Fear River...specifically, at its intersection with Town Creek. *Charles-Town*, for England's King Charles, was this short-lived, new, settlement's name. In fact, the term Carolina is a derivative of the Latin equivalent for Charles....*Carolus*.

British-born Scott and Scotch-Irish would become the predominant settlers in North Carolina, Shallotte, and the South in general. Southern culture, in all its manifestations, is largely an out-growth of the founding Scotch-Irish settlers.

And so, Scottish businessman, seaman and entrepreneur Samuel W. Sleight was the owner of Shallotte Campground property.. a legal-fact that did not seem to bother the congregation. Mr. Sleight used the river-front location for his shipping business. Either in a demonstration of supreme faith, or maybe a complete lack of legal acumen, two different church buildings, 1799 and 1856, were constructed on this site *before the congregation owned it*.

Mr. Sleight was also quite the philanthropist. In 1878, he deeded his property to the congregation of Camp Methodist Church...to have and to hold so long as religious services are so conducted. The Campground, the Shallotte Meeting house, Camp Methodist Church is heading towards 300 years. Who'd ever thought?



MUSIC NOTES FROM WES & BETSY


HANDBELLS TO BE SERVICED AND REPAIRED BY JEFFERS HANDBELLS SUPPLY

Our church presently has a four-octave set of Malmark handbells valued at over \$15,000. These bells need to be serviced and repaired every seven or eight years. A complete full service includes the following: disassembling the handbells, cleaning and polishing the castings with custom cleaning

equipment, repairing any mechanical problems, replacing restraining springs and adjusting the bells to a neutral setting suitable for a wide range of dynamics. Wes took the bells to Jeffers in Irmo, SC the Tuesday after Easter, so we could receive a 5% discount on the servicing of our bells. 
LAKE JUNALUSKA MUSIC AND WORSHIP ARTS WEEK


Children & Youth Ministry

Camp Osprey: Halo and Solo

I first thought it was the rain's fault, but I now think the local buzzards were also a factor in the August collapse of the osprey's nest, adjacent to the Camp playground. The ospreys had returned to their breeding grounds in the spring of 2018, and built a handsome nest of sticks lined with marsh grass. It sat high, in the top of a dead pine tree. Those buzzards never acknowledged the osprey's possession of the old pine tree, often landing at will, near the osprey nest.

The parents, *Bravo* and *Halo* had worked very hard, through record-setting rain, and everything else that came along, and had their one chick *Solo*. at the moment of fledging, *Solo* had a lot to learn: how to fly, and fish, and navigate thousands of miles over open ocean, alone. In the aftermath of the collapse, I found *Solo* on the forest floor, seemingly no worse for the experience. The *Cape Fear Raptor Center* advised no intervention, assuring me the parents could and would continue to care for the chick, even without a nest.

Hopefully it had a happy ending and everyone made their successful, individual, autumn journey to the tropics. Mother Nature can be a tough taskmaster. 2019 was going to be different! I knew the parents

would return to the exact, same, tree ... and they did, arriving on March 11, 2019. Over the winter I'd built them an artificial, aluminum, camera/audio- equipped nesting-platform. So far, it's been an unusual season. The osprey came and made a few half-hearted attempts at nest-building, in their old tree. They never, ever considered their new home ... and then they seemed to abandon this breeding season. While they (officially) "mate for life", I'm not sure that's totally true. Something just never really clicked for them this year. They are still in the neighborhood, and I see them often. They're just not nesting. Maybe next year!

SOME OSPREY FACTS FROM THE U. S. FISH & WILDLIFE SERVICE

The osprey is a large hawk. Adults are dark brown above with brownish-black marks on the wings and brown speckling on the breast. The head is white with a dark brown crown and brown streak down the cheek.

At 18 months, osprey achieve their full adult plumage. Juvenile osprey resemble the adults, but have buff-tipped feathers on the back of their upper body, giving them a speckled appearance, and the streaking on the breast tends to be heavier. As juvenile osprey mature, their eye color changes from brown to yellow. Young osprey make their first migration alone, instinctively knowing where to go without following their parents.

Osprey are found on every continent except Antarctica.

Osprey are great anglers—successful in one out of four dives for fish!






HAITI MISSION TRIP - July 2nd—July 17th



Martha Worsley will be making her 4th mission trip to Haiti in July. She will be joining her friend, Paula Heidrik, for this year's projects. Martha asks for our prayers for their safe travel and a successful conclusion to their mission.

The first week of the trip they will be conducting the village camp for the children. The second week will be devoted to sewing classes. Martha shipped 18 boxes with 16 sewing machines and supplies to Haiti. The sewing machines and supplies will be left in Haiti.

Mental Health Support Coming to Camp United Methodist

Do you have someone in your family suffering from a diagnosed Mental Health challenge? Studies indicate 1 out of 4 in our country has someone in their family suffering a diagnosed challenge. That's a greater number than diabetes and heart disease, but you rarely hear it talked about because mental health is a difficult topic.

Families seeking help typically go to their church first for help, however, less than 10% of churches are equipped to handle these challenges, so they recommend prayer and seeing a licensed professional. When a local program is found they are typically funded through federal grants so they are bound by strict regulations, which preclude any mention of seeking God as a pathway to recovery.

Camp UMC has agreed to be a community resource for those suffering with a mental health challenge, as well as support for family members who care for a loved one suffering from mental illness. We found a Christian based curriculum developed to relieve suffering, reveal Christ and restore lives (John 9: 1-3). The curriculum consists of 16 weekly gatherings designed to provide on going support, holding one another up and sharing practical skills and tools necessary to regain their lives and rebuild their families in a Christ-centered environment with a clear focus on God's grace for life transformation.

There will be a meeting for anyone interested in learning more about this ministry and for those who might be willing to help promote the launch. The meeting will be on Tuesday June 25th at 6:30PM, in the Salmon Room. At the meeting we will share the curriculum as well as testimonials from participants who have successfully completed this program. I ask for your prayers for the Lord to bless this ministry and to touch the hearts of those who feel they can be a part of this important undertaking at CUMC. 

World War II D-Day Invasion June 6

On this historic day in 1944, 156,000 allied troops invaded the beaches of Normandy, France. It is the largest amphibious assault in world history. This massive, bloody battle was the turning point of the war in the European theater.

The allied forces stormed five beaches. American troops landed on Omaha and Utah beach. At the same time, British troops landed on Gold and Sword beach. And, Canadian forces landed on Juno Beach. 4,000 Allied troops died on these beaches on D-Day, 2,000 of them were American.

Please take a moment of silence today to remember those who fought in WWII.

IT HAPPENED IN JUNE

- 1215 King John set his seal to Magna Carta, the first charter of British liberties, guaranteeing basic rights that have since become the foundation of modern democracies around the world.
- 1738 King George III was born. He ruled England for 60 years from 1760 to 1820 and was the British King against whom the American Revolution was directed.
- 1783 The first sustained flight occurred as a hot-air balloon was launched at Annonay, France, by brothers Joseph and Jacques Montgolfier. Their 33-foot-diameter globe aerostatique ascended about 6,000 feet. In September, they repeated the experiment for King Louis XVI, using a sheep, rooster and duck as the balloon's passengers.
- 1872 Pioneering feminist Susan B. Anthony was fined for voting in a presidential election at Rochester, New York. After voting rights had been granted to African American males by the 15th Amendment, she attempted to extend the same rights to women to vote.
- 1876 General George A. Custer, leading 250 men, attacked an encampment of Sioux Indians near Little Bighorn River in Montana. Custer and his men were then attacked by 2000-4000 Indian braves. Only one scout and a single horse survived 'Custer's Last Stand'
- 1898 The British signed a 99-year lease for Hong Kong, located on the southeastern coast of China. Hong Kong, consisting of an area measuring 400 square miles, was administered as a British Crown Colony until July 1 1997, when its sovereignty reverted to the People's Republic of China.
- 1914 Archduke Francis Ferdinand, Crown Prince of Austria and his wife were assassinated at Sarajevo, touching off a conflict between the Austro-Hungarian government and Serbia that escalated into World War I.
- 1926 Marilyn Monroe was born in Los Angeles. Her given name was Norma Jean Mortensen.
- 1929 Anne Frank was born in Frankfurt, Germany. She is perhaps the best known victim of the Nazi Holocaust.
- 1972 Following a seemingly routine burglary, five men were arrested at the National Democratic Headquarters in the Watergate complex in Washington, DC




