Cadence of a Deep Call: a Call to Forgive the Church

We who are weak, fragile and broken, are the church. Secondly, we also need to confess our own sins. Not only have we been hurt by others, but we have hurt our brothers and sisters in Christ intentionally or unintentionally.

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Healing Waters by Bobby Williamson

According to legend, 16th century conquistador/explorer Ponce de Leon first learned of a river, a river flowing with *healing waters lying many days to the north*, from the Caribbean's Taino tribe. History has since linked the Spanish explorer with the pursuit of the fabled fountain of youth. So, how many days ... and just what river were the Taino's alluding to? The possibilities are intriguing!


Historically, the subject of healing waters has always been associated with the Shallotte River. In the 1960's, there were a couple of local signs, one is still nailed to a pine tree, its letters long-since faded, but it once proclaimed . . . *W. G. Clark Place Tackle, Bait, Ice, Boat Launching, HEALING WATER*. The old sign is on highway 179 near the Ocean Isle Airport and the intersection of the Blueberry Road.

"It had the best oysters in the world" as far as my Grandfather was concerned. Such was his description of a former body of water known as Old Sound. The sound's demise was due to the construction of the Intracoastal Waterway, in the 1930's. Old Sound separated the mainland from "Little Beach", a name my great-aunt Flossie always preferred over its modern and official title of Ocean Isle.

In addition to the world's best oysters, Old Sound was also the home of a very rare reed. The combination of wind, sea-water and tidal action, allowed the release of a unique medicinal agent. Bathing in our local waters was once widely known and part of local lore, and culture. Without doubt, from the earliest of times, a spiritual and faith-based element was also a vital component of the miraculous healing waters. Nevertheless, folks would come, armed with jars and various containers, and bottle this healing water for future use.

Today, although the magical reed seems to be less prolific, owing, perhaps, to the loss of Old Sound, the river still heals. Always has, with or without the medicine. Not too surprisingly, the topic of Healing Waters is rarely mentioned now. Modern medicine has long since passed folk-lore remedies. But, in a time before tourism, the healing waters of the Shallotte river were a tourist attraction.






MUSIC NOTES FROM WES & BETSY

Joshua Torbich & Rocky Atkinson

At our meeting on April 30th, Joshua Torbich (Executive Director) and Rocky Atkinson (Chairman of the Board) of the Brunswick Christian Recovery Center presented a program about the center. Each of them gave testimonials on how they came to be connected with the center. Their stories were poignant, powerful and uplifting.

Brunswick County is overflowing with addicted men, many without insurance or money to pay for treatment. The center provides men with a **free** 16-week in-house recovery program. The success rate for the center is about 60%. At the present time, the center can serve only 16-17 men at a time.

Recently a providential thing have happened. One day, outside of Home Depot, a man went up to Josh and asked him if he was from the center. When Josh indicated that he was, the man told him to come to a certain place near where the center is, that he had something to show him. When Josh got there, the man asked him what he saw. It was a house that had been damaged by Hurricane Florence. The man told Josh he wanted to give the center his house. Wow! The damage turned out to be minimal. Updates and repairs will be completed soon. The addition of the house to the center's property will enable the center to provide care for up to 30 men.

YARD SALE


The yard sale on April 27th really started on the April 22nd with the collection, sorting, pricing and displaying of item for sale. The donations were plentiful.

IT HAPPENED IN MAY

325 A.D. - The Council of Nicaea, 1st ecumenical council of Catholic Church called by Constantine I, first Christian Emperor of the Roman Empire. With nearly 300 bishops in attendance at Nicaea in Asia Minor, the council condemned Arianism which denied Christ's divinity, formulated the Nicene Creed and fixed the date of Easter.

1494 - During his second journey of exploration in the New World, Christopher Columbus discovered Jamaica.

1527 - The Renaissance ended with the Sack of Rome by German troops as part of an ongoing conflict between the Hapsburg Empire and the French Monarchy. German troops killed over 4,000 Romans, imprisoned the Pope, and looted works of art and libraries. An entire year passed before order could be restored in Rome.

1707 - Great Britain was formed from a union between England and Scotland. The union included Wales which was already a part of England since the 1500's. The United Kingdom today consists of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

1796 - Smallpox vaccine was developed by Dr. Edward Jenner, an English physician. He coined the term vaccination for the new procedure of injecting a milder form of the disease into healthy people which resulted in immunity. Within 18 months, 12,000 people in England had been vaccinated and the # of smallpox deaths dropped by two-thirds.

1875 - The first Kentucky Derby horse race took place at Churchill Downs in Louisville.

1937 - The German airship Hindenburg burst into flames at 7:20 p.m. as it neared the mooring mast at Lakehurst, NJ, following a trans-Atlantic voyage. Thirty six of the 97 passengers and crew were killed.

1954 - In *Brown v. Board of Education*, the U.S. Supreme Court unanimously ruled that segregation of public schools "solely on the basis of race" denies black children "equal educational opportunity" even though "physical facilities and other 'tangible'" factors may have been equal. Thurgood Marshall had argued the case before the Court. He went on to become the first African American appointed to the Supreme Court.

1980 - Mount St. Helens volcano erupted in southwestern Washington State spewing steam and ash over 11 miles into the sky. This was its first major eruption since 1857.

MATCH (*Mothers and their Children Primarily Funded by the UMW of NC*)

Camp's two UMW Circles, the Susannah Wesley Circle and the Joy Circle, joined together to travel to the N.C. Correctional Institution for Women near Raleigh, on Tuesday, April 9th. Most of the circles of the UMW of NC contribute financially to fund this MATCH program, a program that enables a female inmate (who qualifies) to have three hours or more of personal, up-close contact with their children (up to the age of 18) once a month.



Otherwise, the inmates have to sit in chairs lined up opposite their children when they visit, with out any touching! What the UMW is doing is so worthy. Can you imagine as a child/young person, being able to see but not touch your mother? The UMW provides a home-like atmosphere in a room with sofa, a child's beanbag, children's table, games, books, and a refrigerator stocked with quick foods for the mothers and children to have. A qualified counselor is in the room with the family.

This room is inside the prison security fence, so that it is still part of the prison experience. Our UMW feels that we are helping those children of the prisoners to grow up feeling loved by their parent, hopefully helping them to grow into non-aggressive adults. Also, this program is quite an incentive for the prisoner try to remain "infraction-free", which they must be in order to remain a part of the MATCH program. We are so pleased to contribute to this MATCH program, encouraging love between parent and child, even if the parent is behind bars. If you would like to contribute any funds towards this program, any UMW member will be glad to accept it for you.

Both circles will meet in the Fellowship Hall. The Joy Circle will meet on May 13th at 6:30. The Susanna Wesley Circle on May 14th at 10:00. **ALL women are welcome.**

MOTHER'S DAY

 The modern holiday of Mother's Day was first celebrated in 1908, when Anna Jarvis held a memorial for her mother at St Andrew's Methodist Church in Grafton, West Virginia. Her campaign to make Mother's Day a recognized holiday in the United States began in 1905, the year her mother, Ann Reeves Jarvis, died

In 1908, the U.S. Congress rejected a proposal to make Mother's Day an official holiday, joking that they would also have to proclaim a "Mother-in-law's Day". However, owing to the efforts of Anna Jarvis, by 1911 all U.S. states observed the holiday with some of them officially recognizing Mother's Day as a local holiday.

MEMORIAL DAY

Memorial Day is an American holiday honoring the men and women who died while serving in the U.S. military. For decades, Memorial Day was observed on May 30, but in 1968 Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, which established Memorial Day as the last Monday in May in order to create a three-day weekend for federal employees. The change went into effect in 1971. The same law also declared Memorial Day a federal holiday.

Each year on Memorial Day a national moment of remembrance takes place at 3:00 p.m. local time. Consider making this a tradition in your family.




