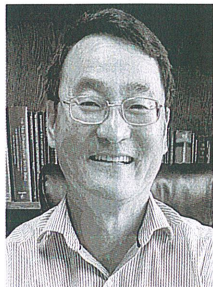

## Cadence of a Deep Call: a Call to be Thankful

Mee Young and I celebrated our thirty-second wedding anniversary on June 6<sup>th</sup>. I cannot believe how fast time has gone by. I have been SO blessed with my lovely wife who has been my best friend, my best sermon critic, my playmate, and my soulmate. We have become so close to each other over three decades that sometimes we are surprised that we think and feel exactly the same thing! My two beautiful children have also been so blessed. Both of them have become first time home buyers in Durham, NC. - one last year and one this year.

Camp United Methodist Church has been a blessing to my family and me since we came here two years ago. We have received more cards, more support, more gifts and more prayers than we received in any of the other churches we have served. We are truly blessed!

God has been doing marvelous things in this church since Mee Young and I came to Camp. Our debt has been reduced from 1.2 million dollars to \$450,000! WOW! We have always been able to overcome any financial difficulties. In 2017, not only were we able to pay our apportionment one hundred percent, but we were also able to pay the apportionment that we couldn't pay in 2016 (around \$8,500). While our debt has been reduced, our average worship attendance has increased from 284 in 2016 to 379 in 2019.

The secret of abundant living is to not take things for granted, but to be appreciative of each moment we have with our family, neighbors, church family and friends both near and far. I love to look at Mee Young closely more than ever. When I look at her, I feel so grateful and thankful for the patience she has shown me over the years, for the hidden sacrifices she has made for me and the church, for the encouragement she has spoken, for the trust she has confided in me, and for the tears of love and compassion that she has shed. Well, I have everything that I need under heaven - a beautiful wife, beautiful children, beautiful church families and neighbors both near and far!

## OUR HERITAGE

'Uncle' Ike

The campus of Camp Methodist Church has really changed over the years. Although the site was granted to the assembly by Samuel Sleight..."to have for as long as religious services are conducted..." By the early 1950's, several parcels from the original tract had been divested. In addition to the actual church building, the site was also home to the Post Office, Coastal Drug Store, and Dr. M.H. Rourk's office. All were located in the present front yard. Adjacent to the river, in the current parking area, was Mr. Ike Reynold's blacksmith shop.

'Uncle' Ike was legendary. He's *still* one of my personal hero's... a self-taught, mechanical genius, who epitomized North Carolina's motto *Esse Quam Videri, To Be, Rather Than to Seem*. Uncle Ike could *make* stuff, almost anything. Before electrification, Mr. Ike welded metals in his shop with a forge. During World War II, local businessman, H. A. Stanland procured a government contract for coal-hauling from the port of Wilmington to various government installations in the area. This operation utilized a gasoline-powered conveyor- belt machine to load the coal on delivery trucks. During WWII, raw materials were rationed as the American economy was essentially focused on the war effort. When a large, toothed ring-gear, on the conveyor-belt loader broke, it was serious. Very serious... A replacement gear, at the time, was impossible. The coal hauling contract hung in the balance. After studying the situation, at his over-the-river machine shop, Mr. Ike finally said, "Leave that gear with me...I'll see what I can do..." Somehow, Mr. Ike Reynolds MADE a new gear, right here, on these grounds... I'm not sure if his shop had electricity, and I don't know if the part was cast or carved, but a gear has to be accurate, and it was.

Uncle Ike could make about anything, usually starting with nothing. One of his specialties was coffins, using the finest wood and carpentry he could muster, complete with lined and sewn interiors. When asked how many he'd made over the years, his son, Buck, estimated that they'd built about 300 coffins. All for the community, and he never charged anything. His coffin-making skills were a complete gift to the community. He build 'um as the need arose.\* Times were tough, and folks done what they could.

By the 1950's, times were changing, Camp was planning to expand with a new sanctuary. Mr. Ike's famous shop was severely damaged by Hurricane Hazel in 1954. Although he had a 99-year lease on the site, he chose to re-locate. He built a new shop just beyond the bridge on the Whiteville Road and with the help of his son, Buck, the family business continued, until destruction by a lightning strike in the 1960's.

Over the years, Camp Methodist's location has been the site of various endeavors, although it's been used primarily for religious services, as was required by the original deed of gift. Some have been spiritual and educational, but some efforts have been physical, in the present, a trait that still continues. Most have left the community better than they found it. May it forever be.

## **Small Group/Bible Studies for Fall 2019-Spring 2020**

**Disciple I** A 34-week study that explores Genesis to Revelation incorporating the plan that God has for the world and for us. Includes a DVD and study manual that guides group discussion and leads participants to a clearer understanding of who they are as His child/disciple.

**Disciple II** Genesis to Exodus and Luke to Acts are the focus of this 32- week study prepared for graduates of Disciple I. This study emphasizes the rhythm of coming to God and going for God, of being in the Word and in the world individually and corporately.

**Disciple III** A 32-week Bible study that covers the Prophets and the Letters of Paul with attention given to geography and history. Keeping our eyes on God at work in history will help us see His work and love in our lives.

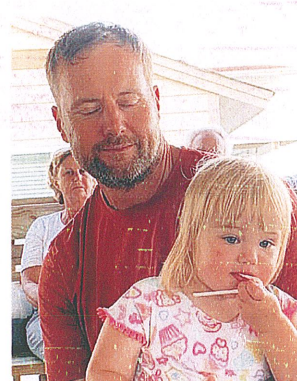

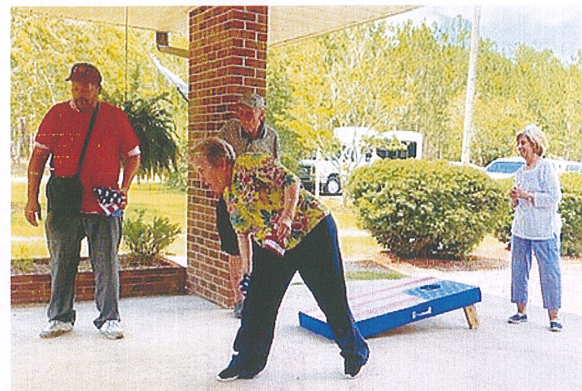

**Do you know someone who is suffering from a diagnosed mental health challenge?** We are ready to launch the CUMC Living and Family Grace ministries beginning on Tuesday evening August 26<sup>th</sup> from 6:15pm to 7:45pm in the upstairs classrooms.

Our Living and Family Grace support groups goal is to help our loved ones understand they are loved by our Lord and Savior and they can improve their diagnoses. These groups are not designed to 'fix' their challenges with mental health, but rather to support their effort to get better through a relationship with Jesus Christ.

Camp's Grief Share Programs will start on August 29th. There will be an **afternoon session** from **1:00-3:00** and an **evening session** from **6:15-8:15**. Both sessions will be in the Salmon Classroom: Vivian Carper will facilitate the afternoon session; Steve & Carol McCreedy will facilitate the evening session. There are 13 weeks in the program.

**What is the program:** Through Christ-Centered Videos, Group Discussions and a Personal Workbook, in this study you will have an opportunity to gain some insight and helpful tools to move through the Journey of Grief. If you have experienced or are currently moving through a loss, this program will help you discover things you can do to make your grief journey more bearable and how to move from mourning to joy.

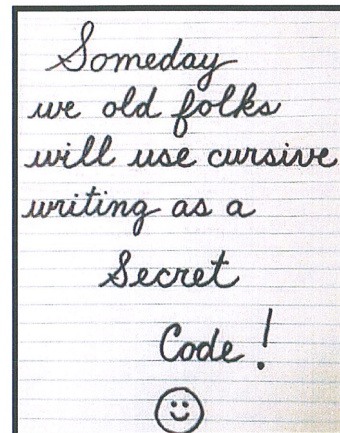
**1920** The 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was ratified, granting women the right to vote.

## SHEPHERDING MINISTRY

### 1 Corinthians 12:26 New Revised Standard Version (NRSV)

"If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it."

The purpose of this ministry is: to increase the sense of fellowship and caring among the membership, to reach those persons not currently being reached and to support and enrich other church ministries.

**What does a Lay Shepherd do?** A shepherd is responsible for 4 to 6 flocks (households) and uses **PACE**: **Prays** for each household daily, is **Available** to households, **Contacts** his/her "flock" at least once a month, and is a Christian **Example**. Other duties include: completing monthly contact reports; notifying the Pastor with concerns or emergencies; Recognizing significant events in your flock's household lives; maintaining confidentiality.

### What skills/qualifications does a shepherd need

A commitment to Christ and Camp UMC

An ability to listen

Membership at Camp

Is a good listener, compassionate, trusty worthy and can maintain confidentiality

A willingness to commit to this ministry and to the equipping process

Seek to grow in your Christian walk

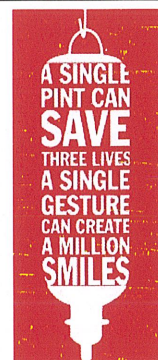
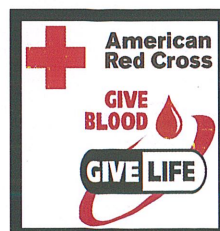

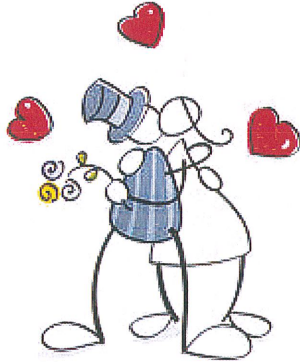
