Love Shed Abroad Our Hearts

Romans 5:1-5



During our *Almost Christmas* Advent Worship Series and book study, one of John Wesley's questions lingered with me: "Is God's love shed abroad in our heart?" John Wesley was looking at Romans 5:5 which tells us that hope doesn't disappoint us, because (as John Wesley translates it) "the love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost." This time of year is filled with tradition and expectation. As we transitioned from Advent to the Christmas Season and into the new year, I found myself wondering about this question of love. So much has been stripped away in 2020 from our holiday practices and typical expressions of love. I find it refreshing and challenging to ask the question about God's love being shed abroad in my heart.

The passage in Romans speaks of having peace with God through our Lord Christ and his grace. The passage goes as far as saying we can boast in our suffering. God even redeems our suffering to transform us to grow in perseverance, character and hope. So I wonder if this is an opportunity for us to reimagine how we live out this love, in the reality of our reality. God arrived in the flesh for love to be born among us and in us in the reality of our lives. Is the love of God shed abroad in our heart - is the love of God not only being born in us, but also through us?

As we enter 2021, after this very unique experience of the 2020 Christmas season, may we allow the love of God to be born through us in new and creative ways. Over 2000 years ago, God never intended for the love of God made flesh to be limited to a single moment in history. but rather for it to be continual and eternal as we participate in the mystery of the Body of Christ. As we look back at the last year of our suffering and the disruption of our precious traditions, may we realize that others suffered, too. May we enter the new year with God's love and compassion

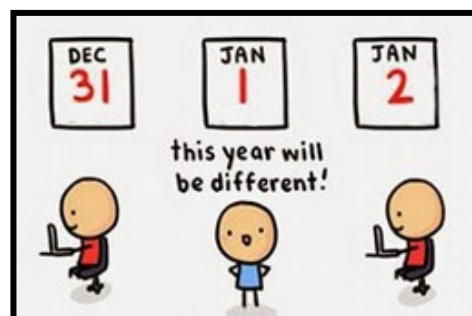

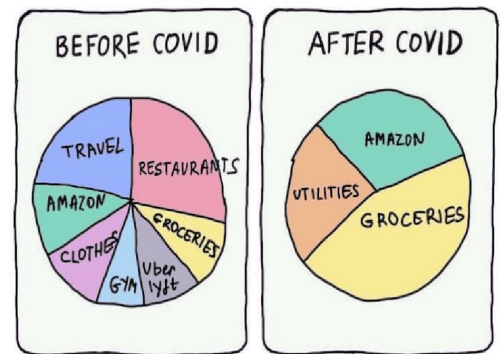

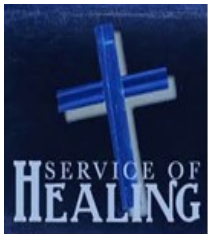
