## General Conference Information Session

On July 13 we gathered for our General Conference Information Session. There was a great turnout as the Rev. Belton Joyner, a retired United Methodist Pastor and a clergy delegate to General Conference, presented an overview of how the Methodist Church is structured (our polity) and offered a basic introduction to General Conference. This was to set the groundwork as we begin this work together. He reminded us that ever since the New Testament, starting with the story from Acts of the Jerusalem Council meeting to discuss the gentiles' involvement in the church and circumcision, the Christian church has had gatherings like a General Conference to navigate challenging questions facing the church. The upcoming General Conference will be considering the significant proposal for our reorganization as a denomination and our struggle regarding the topic of human sexuality. Rev. Joyner reminded us that the discussion regarding a split is not the only business to be addressed at this upcoming General Conference. He illustrated this when he held up the large workbooks that included the many decisions before the General Conference.

Attendees were given the opportunity to write their questions down. We were only able to address a few of those questions taking but, all of the questions have been recorded. We are working on the best means of addressing these questions and will be answering them in upcoming meetings, emails, and in the church newsletter.

A few questions indicated a desire to learn more about the Protocol of Reconciliation and Grace through Separation. The Protocol is addressing our reorganization as a denomination in light of differing views on human sexuality, and this is one of the things that will go before General Conference in 2022. As with any legislation that goes before the General Conference it can be changed, adjusted, or even rejected. On September 28 at 6:30PM, the Rev. Gray Southern has been invited to come and offer a presentation on the protocol as it currently stands right now to help us have a better understanding of what is before us. ### Perseid meteor shower

The Perseids, the most popular annual meteor shower, will be visible from July 17th-August 26th. Peak time to see the shower this year will be from August 11th-13th.

**Here's the “not so good” news-the best time to look for both of these wonders is from midnight to dawn.**



### The Milky Way

The Milky Way becomes visible starting in April. By mid-June it is visible shortly after sunset. By July it's already up after dark and in August you'll be able to see it arc across the night sky, **but only if you're under an inky black sky close to the New Moon.** The New Moon in August will be on the 8th.






