



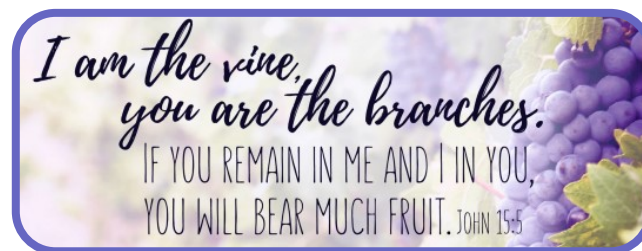
# *The Circuit Rider*

# **CHURCH COMMITTEE RESPONSIBILITIES IN A NUTSHELL**

## **FINANCE COMMITTEE**

The Finance Committee annually presents a budget for supporting the mission and vision to the church council for review and adoption. It is responsible for developing and carrying out plans to raise enough income to support the budget that has been approved. It arranges for an annual audit of financial records and makes a report of this audit to the charge conference. The committee prepares an annual report to the church council of all designated funds that are separate from general funds (e.g. Memorial Fund, Mission donations, Friday Night Meals, Altar Guild, (etc.).

## **PASTOR PARISH/STAFF RELATIONS COMMITTEE**

The SPPR Committee counsels pastor and staff on relationships with the congregation, priorities, skills and goals, and conveys these priorities, skills and goals to the congregation. It develops and recommends to church council staff positions and job descriptions for staff other than pastors. It does annual evaluations for pastor and staff to encourage effective ministry. "The committee will cooperate with the pastor(s), the district superintendent and the bishop in securing clergy leadership."

## **TRUSTEE COMMITTEE**

The Trustee Committee has oversight and care of all church property, buildings and equipment. This work is done in consultation with the pastor. Trustees receive and administer all gifts made to the congregation and ensure that the congregation's trust funds are invested properly. Trustees ensure that the Articles of Incorporation of the congregation are kept up-to-date. This committee submits annual budget requests to the committee on finance for property maintenance and improvement and new property purchases.

## **LAY LEADERSHIP COMMITTEE**

The Lay Leadership Committee identifies the skills, gifts and spiritual leadership of church members. It matches potential leaders with various positions. The committee helps church members discern their gifts and equips them for service through training and support. The committee presents a nomination list to the charge conference for:

- a Church Council Chair
- a SPPR Committee and its chair,
- a Trustee Committee
- a Finance Committee and its chair, financial secretary and treasurer.
- a Lay Member to Annual Conference
- a Lay Leader.

The committee works with the church council throughout the year to identify other leaders for ministries that fulfill the mission of the congregation.

## A VERY SPECIAL EXPERIENCE

On October 6th, I got up from a very restless night. I had not slept well and had a lot on my mind and on my heart. I took my son to school. On my way back home as I was driving down my street, I noticed this little guy in the road. I pulled to the side of him thinking he would fly away as I approached. As I went by, I noticed he did not move. I looked in my side view and he was still there. I parked my car and started walking towards him. I expected him to either fly or at least start struggling to get away. He did not move. I walked straight to him and picked him up. He never attempted to struggle away from me as you can see in this picture. I did not have to restrain him at all.



I examined him and saw no sign of injury. Yet I knew something was not right. I pulled him close to my heart and began to gently pet him. I decided I would take him to the CNC. They help a lot of wildlife. It would be a couple of hours before they opened. As I continued to hold him, there was an immediate bond. He would look me right in the eye and put his beak to my nose. I was finally able to take him to CNC. Unfortunately for this little guy, they do not take songbirds. Only birds of prey. However, they were kind enough to examine him. Upon examination, they were able to determine he had a broken clavicle. They told me just like for humans, it is very painful for the birds. They thought he had been hit by a car.

CNC recommended a place to take him. It is located in Decatur, which was going to take a little over an hour one way with traffic. I had a full day and did not know how I could do it. As I sat in the car trying to decide what I was going to do, he sang. I stopped my thought processes and looked down at him. He was looking at me from the little box I had him in. As I continued to look at him he let out a couple of more little notes. Tears began to fill my eyes. Here this tiny little creature was, in pain with a broken clavicle, and yet, he still sang. I sat there for a few minutes just looking at him. I reached over and gave him a gentle stroke on his head and said, "Thank you, little guy."

I called my office asked that all of my meetings for the day be rescheduled. I called the songbird place and a wonderful woman, Nancy, told me to bring him in. I took off for Decatur. When we arrived, Nancy examined him and confirmed he had a broken clavicle but also said that his air sacs were full and needed to be released. She explained to me the process and told me he had a three to four-week recovery ahead. She let me know that some make it and some do not because of the uncertainty of what he may have going on internally due to being hit. She also informed me that if he did make it, then at the end of his recovery, he would need to be released where I found him. (*Cardinals generally have a family.*) He had a rough road. There were a couple of times she wasn't sure he was going to make it, as he stopped eating a few times. He pushed through though. and I was able to pick him up and release him back into nature.

I share this experience with you because this little bird reminded me that we can still sing even when we are struggling. When we are struggling and in pain, we can still make a difference. He reminded me that every living thing is significant, no matter what. If it has life, it deserves love. It is a birthright! He reminded me to stop, take it slow, and always, ALWAYS, let love lead. On a day when I was struggling with some pretty heavy things, he reminded me to...sing!!

## LOCAL MISSIONS 2021

Listed below is a brief synopsis of what outreach Camp provided last year.

### STREETREACH/BUILDING HOPE MINISTRY

In July and August, our committee, with the help of our church members, completed several projects for Building Hope Ministry: a short privacy fence, a 10x12 deck, benches for their playground, and improvements to their driveway and parking area. We collected supplies and food for the homeless. In November and December, our members collected blankets, coats and gift cards. In addition, several church members have made monetary donations.

### ADOPT-A-SCHOOL

In May Camp held an end-of-the-year breakfast at our church with our own Praise Band honoring the Union Staff before the meal. In August our church collected boxes and boxes of school supplies for Union and Shallotte Middle. Every other month, our committee honored Union's staff with small appreciation gifts, put together with love. We sponsored Prayer Packets for Union School Staff. Every person of at the school is thought of and prayed for by our church members. In August and December, donations were made for supplies for needy students to both schools.

### POWER WALKING MINISTRIES

Our church collected 86 pairs of shoes and donated \$850 for our Brunswick County children in need of shoes.

### Simple Chicken Casserole

- 1 pkg. Pepperidge Farm dressing
- 1 can of chicken broth
- 1 stick of butter or margarine
- 1 cup of cubed cooked chicken
- 2 cans of Cream of Chicken Soup

Mix all ingredients, except dressing mix and stick of butter and set aside. Reserve about 1/3 of dressing mix. Mix 2 or 3 Tbs. of chicken broth with dressing in bottom of baking dish. Pour chicken mixture over this and top with dressing mixture. Pour 1 stick of butter over all and bake for 20 minutes at 350°. Top with grated cheese (optional) until melted.

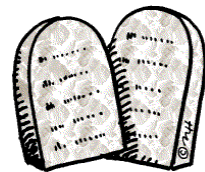
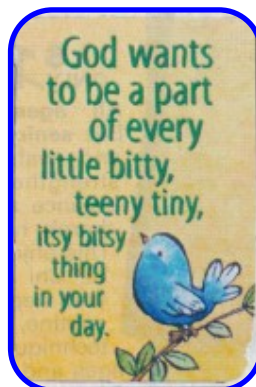
